Subject

Report on the CA Uniform Public Construction Cost Accounting Act

Purpose

To educate the Board on an alternative to pursuing legislation following the Board's request to pursue legislation to increase Metropolitan's threshold for public bidding on construction contracts

CA Uniform Public Construction Cost Accounting Act

Established in 1983 to promote uniform cost accounting standards and bidding procedures for construction work initiated by public agencies

Voluntary program available to all public agencies who have "opted in"

Allows for increased thresholds for public bidding on construction contracts

Key Provisions

Currently, Metropolitan has a public bidding threshold of \$25,000. It may award public works contracts below this threshold without bidding, while requiring public bidding for contracts of \$25,000 or higher.

CUPCCAA raises the threshold as follows:Under \$75,000Negotiated Contract or Force Acct\$75,000 220,000Informal Public BiddingOver \$220,000Formal Public Bidding

CUPCCAA thresholds are adjusted for inflation.

Requirements for Metropolitan Adoption

"Opting in" requires:

- Board adopted resolution stating Metropolitan elects to comply with the provisions of CUPCCAA, under Public Contracts Code 22030
- Board adopted policy to comply with the informal bidding requirements of the Act (i.e. prequalified contractors list and notice inviting bids)

Board has discretion to "opt out" at any time.

CUPCCAA Governance and Enforcement

Governed and enforced by the CA Uniform Construction Cost Accounting Commission, under the State Controller's Office

Supported by the Construction Industry Force Account Council, a non-profit coalition of construction industry, contractors and labor unions that conducts investigations, reports findings to the Commission and advises public agencies on CUPCCAA compliance.

Conclusion

Staff review of the CUPCCAA policies and procedures has determined that compliance with the Act would not pose an undue burden to our operations while providing benefits in the form of increasing our threshold for public bidding and streamlining execution of construction contracts.

Subject

Report on legislative proposal sponsored by Eastern Municipal Water District

Purpose

To educate the Board on active legislation affecting the Metropolitan Water District Act and its Board of Directors.

Summary

Author: Assemblymember Irwin (D-Thousand Oaks) Sponsor: Eastern Municipal Water District

Summary: Amends the Metropolitan Water District Act to allow for the appointment of alternate board members to the Metropolitan Board of Directors.

Five-year sunset which would expire January 1, 2031.

Purpose

For member agencies with more than one representative, any individual representative may cast the entirety of the weighted votes allotted to that member agency. But agencies with only one member lose their entire vote when their representative is absent.

This bill would allow each member agency that only has one representative to appoint an alternate board member. The alternate shall serve for the limited purpose of participating in a meeting of the Board when the primary board member will be absent.

Specific Provisions

Participation of the alternate does not include assuming any board officer positions.

Alternate participation requires 5 business days advanced notice.

The member agency is responsible for additional costs related to alternate participation.

Additional Considerations

The alternates will not have any roles or responsibilities separate from the standing board members.

The addition of alternates does not change the weighted vote structure of the Board.

Legislative History

AB 885 (Calderon) – 2008 Sponsored by: Central Basin MWD

This bill would have authorized a member public agency to appoint a proxy to attend, participate, and vote at a meeting if its representative appointed or selected pursuant to existing law cannot attend the meeting.

Vetoed by Governor Schwarzenegger

Dear Colorado River Basin States Representatives,

As the United States Senators for the seven Colorado River Basin States, we place great value on a seven-state consensus agreement regarding management of the Colorado River in 2026 and beyond. We all know the stakes: the drought conditions that confront us are top of mind for you, us, and all of our constituents. We recognize that negotiating any agreement in the Colorado River Basin is a difficult task, and appreciate all of the work that you have done and will do. We understand that a framework for agreement must be developed within a matter of months for it to be properly analyzed by the Department of the Interior and finalized before current agreements expire. We encourage you to meet thequently, to foster a collaborative effort.

We recognize that development of a consensus agreement will require substantial effort and may require legislation for implementation. We stand rearly to work with you to ensure necessary authorities are granted by Congress.

We invite you to provide a joint briefing in the months to come to describe what a seven-state agreement could look like and to discuss any legislative action that may be necessary to put that consensus plan into action. We look forward to building on our continued partnership to ensure Colorado River Basin States have the tools needed to avert the worst of the drought crisis that faces us, and to successfully manage our water resources for ganerations to conte-



Highlights

External Affairs staff in media services, community outreach, and legislative services supported Metropolitan's response to wildfires by working with member agencies on operations and water quality issues, responding to news media, preparing communications to employees, and serving in Metropolitan and the LA County operations centers. Produced fact sheets on Metropolitan's operational response for distribution to state, federal, and local officials. (January 8-20)

Directors DeJesus, Luna, and Dennstedt, AGM Chapman, DEI officer Thomas, and staff attended the quarterly meeting of the Southern California Water Coalition. (January 24)

Chair Ortega, Vice Chair Camacho, Directors Bryant, Crawford, Dennstedt, Dick, Erdman, Fellow, Garza, Goldberg, Lewitt, Seckel and Sutley, former MWD executives Gastelum and Ivey, GM Upadhyay, Metropolitan and member agency staff and more than 100 guests attended the dedication of the Philip J. Pace Board Room. (January 28)

Responded to media inquiries about water supply for Southern California following DWR's first snow survey of the year, which measured 91 percent of average snow depth and water equivalent for this time of year.

<u>Federal</u>

President Trump issued a series of Executive Orders including one directing Interior and Commerce agencies to "route more water from the Sacramento-San Joaquin Delta to other parts of the state" and provide a progress report on the implementation along with recommendations for future actions in the next 90 days.

State

On January 10, Governor Newsom released the FY 2025-26 budget which proposes funding for a number of key Metropolitan priorities, including \$2.7 billion from the climate bond for projects including dam safety, water quality, and recycled water. The Governor also signed legislation directing \$2.5 billion in wildfire relief efforts.

Local

This month, staff presented, monitored, and/or participated in 56 webinars, meetings, and events with community organizations and trade associations on Metropolitan activities, issues, and other topics.

Arranged for Bay-Delta Resources' Hawk to speak to the Torrance Water Commission about the Delta Conveyance Project. (January 22)

Media and Communications

Arranged multiple interviews with GM Upadhyay, AGM Chapman, and other Metropolitan staff with media outlets, including AP, LA Times, Wall Street Journal, and LA Daily News, on water supply, operation of water facilities and infrastructure, and water quality conditions following wildfires.

Set up an interview with WRM's Goshi and Southern California Daily News reporter Steve Scauzillo on a story about drought in Southern California.

Press Releases and Statements

Award of \$186 million in federal funds for turf replacement/desert water bank program/leak detection/repair; Announced seating of Director Mel Katz representing San Diego County Water Agency; Issued statement supporting state's actions to reduce State Water Project pumping in the Delta due to turbidity issues.

Debuted 2024 Year in Review video with highlights on Metropolitan leadership, milestones, and board activities.

Produced and distributed first in a series of Safety Matters videos showcasing employees who have introduced new safety measures at facilities.




