Purpose

To provide updates on conservation expenditures and activity, as well as additional items, as needed.

Current Conservation Program Expenditures FYs 2024/25& 2025/26®

Regional Devices	\$1.0 M	\$1.1 M
Member Agency Administered	\$6.0 M	\$6.7 M
Turf Replacement	\$14.7 M	\$29.3 M
Advertising	\$1.4 M	\$0.9 M
Other	\$2.4 M	\$1.7 M
TOTAL	\$25.5 M	\$39.7 M

- (1) The Conservation Program biennial expenditure authorization is \$98.2M.
- (2) Paid as of 7/1/2024 8/31/2025. Financial reporting on cash basis.

Current Conservation Program Activity FYs 2024/25 & 2025/26



Turf Replacement Rebates:

August: 278,372 ft² replaced

FY2024/25-FY2025/26: 6,926,211 ft² replaced



Trees (part of Turf Replacement Program):

August: 186 trees rebated

FY2024/25-FY2025/26: 2,459 units rebated



Clothes Washers:

August: 453 units rebated

FY2024/25-FY2025/26: 8,660 units rebated

Lifetime Water Savings to be achieved by all rebates in August 2025: 2,020 AF

FY2024/25-FY2025/26: 54,407 AF lifetime water savings

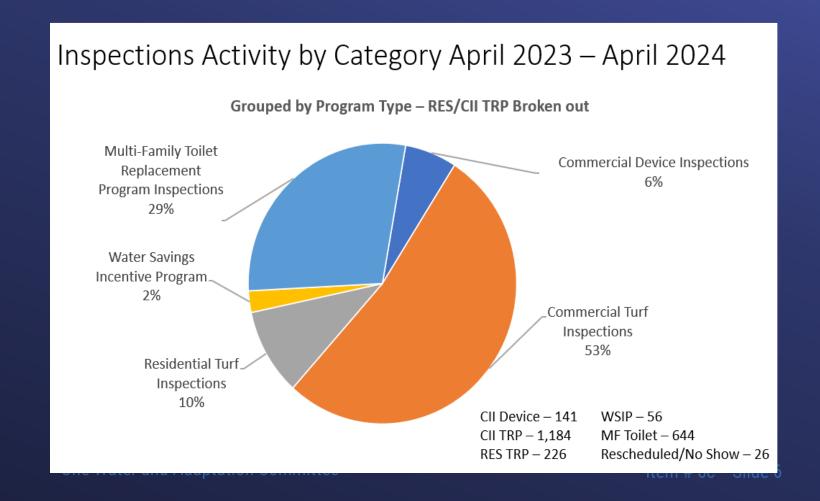
Recap: Response to Questions

Metropolitan measures the efficacy of the Conservation program by:

- 1) Using industry-wide assumptions to estimate water savings per measure
- 2) Ensuring qualifying devices or models meet or exceed performance standards
- 3) Verifying the installation of measures through a robust inspection program

Inspection Activity by Category

Metropolitan's Inspection Program includes both random and automatic inspections (for high value applications)



What Happens When an Inspection Fails?



Inspections verify the installation of devices/measures eligible for rebate

Most common issues encountered:

- Discrepancies with number devices installed
- Ineligible device (or not listed among qualifying models)
- Measurement of turf replacement project area: pre and post installation

Resolution

- Staff work with member and retail agencies to resolve issues
- Goal is to help applicants remain eligible for rebates

Inspections verify the installation of devices/measures eligible for rebate

Resolving the Issue When an Inspection Fails



Inspection
Failure
Applicant

Applicant takes no action;
Application closed

Applicant resolves issue; Additional inspection performed if needed

Applicant requests an exception;
Metropolitan and/or Agency reviews.
Additional inspection may be
performed

Applicant disputes findings;
Metropolitan reviews / assesses case;
Outcomes vary

receives the

application is
closed

Exception Process



Exceptions may be considered

- Issues with qualified product lists
- Unforeseen implementation challenges
- 1. Applicant submits request to Vendor; elevated to Metropolitan for review
- 2. Requests evaluated by program (e.g. Turf Replacement Program or Device Rebate Program)
- 3. Member/Retail Agencies are included in the decision, especially if the application includes co-funding
- 4. Reviews may include past participation check, photo reviews, and other supporting documentation
- 5. A decision to approve or deny the request is made or elevated for additional review
