Research Findings Key Findings

What are Community Benefits?

- Voluntary commitments
- No legal definition for "community benefits"
- Started in 1960s and evolved from parks & trees to address environmental justice and impacts to underserved communities
- Complement environmental justice requirements in NEPA, CEQA and grants



Internal Context Factors: Metropolitan Projects



Metropolitan Projects with Community Benefits

- Diamond Valley Lake: Recreation Funding Program
 - Multi-agency agreement formed to develop recreational opportunities for local & regional communities, including on water activities and trails
- Rotational Land Fallowing Partnership with PVID Community Improvement Fund & Enhancement Collaborative
 - Community Development & Workforce Development
 Opportunities for communities in the Palo Verde Valley




Metropolitan Programs with Community Benefits


- Project Labor Agreement
 - Provisions include fair wages, local hiring goals and promotes small business opportunities
- Diversity, Equity & Inclusion Framework
 - Framework establishes goals and initiatives for workforce development, industry fairness, and community inclusion
- Climate Adaptation Master Plan for Water
 - **Equity** is reflected and a component of CAMP4W's Policy and Climate Decision-Making Framework, and Evaluative Criteria

Program Area: Underserved & Disadvantaged Communities

- 40% of PWSC Program area
- 70% of PWSC
 Residents <1
 mile of pipeline

Developing a Potential Community Benefits Approach Framework

Framework Objectives

- ✓ Balances region-wide program benefits with local impacts
- ✓ Helps address potential residual impacts
- ✓ Prioritizes community input
- ✓ Considers various context factors
 - Internal precedents
 - Policy drivers
 - Equity data

Regional Water Supply,

- Increases water resiliency
- Replenishes groundwater basins
- Provides a sustainable local supply of water

#2 Community Focused Design

- Integrates community input in design
- Prioritizes alignment with least impact
- Embeds equity & culture

#3

Environmental Mitigation, Permit Agreement Conditions, and Regulatory Compliance

- <u>CEQA/NEPA Mitigation:</u> Avoid, reduce, or monitor construction impacts
- <u>Permit Conditions:</u> Restore streets, parks, and utilities to equal or better condition
- <u>State/Federal Regulatory Compliance:</u> Meet all waterquality, air-quality, and worker-safety standards

Jobs & Small Business Opportunities

#4

Workforce Development and Local Business
Opportunities

- Project Labor Agreement: 60% local-hire and 15% transitionalworker goals
- <u>Equitable Procurement:</u> Business Outreach program sets targets for small, local, and diverse firms
- Carson Workforce Training Center: Programs leading to careers in treatment, conveyance, and other water-sector trades
- <u>Career Pathway Outreach:</u> Engagement with local communities to showcase Metropolitan employment opportunities

Pure Water Southern California Approach Framework for Community Benefits

#5 Additional Community Benefits

- Enhance communities near program facilities
- Prioritize underserved corridors
- Align with the Envision Certification's well-being & community standards

- Direct Actions Metropolitanfunded projects (e.g., park upgrades, traffic-calming, noise buffers) selected with local input
- Community Benefits Funds –
 grants guided by community
 advisory committees to advance
 health, jobs, and resilience goals
