







Evolution





- Add new resources and improve flexibility in response to feedback
- Program target helps meet long-term needs and signals continued commitment to local supply development

Refinements



- Allowed three incentive payment options
- Included on-site retrofit costs for recycled water projects
- Inclusion of Seawater Desalination
- Reimbursable Services
 - Expedites the development of ready-to-proceed local projects
 - Metropolitan participation considers
 - Urgency of the need to accelerate specific projects
 - Availability of Metropolitan staff to dedicate to project
 - No Metropolitan financing. All direct and indirect costs reimbursed to Metropolitan



Project must:

- Be supported by a Metropolitan member agency
- Replace demand on Metropolitan's imported water
- Not be existing or under construction
- Include construction of substantial new treatment or distribution facilities
- Be ready to proceed
 - Comply with CEQA and/or NEPA
 - Have obtained all required permits
 - Have interagency agreements, if applicable





- Application is accepted on an open and continuous basis
 - Application is not a reservation of funds
- One application for each project
- Member agency must submit LRP application before start of construction (award of bids)
- Member Agency must submit:
 - Supporting Letter
 - California Environment Quality Act documentation
 - Project permits






- Agreement Term : 25 years
- Allowable yield
 - Source water
 - Exclusions
 - Threshold
- Eligible facilities and costs
 - Treatment and/or Distribution
 - Shared facilities
- Annual production and/or cost reconciliation
- Performance provisions
- Audit

Performance Provisions







Project Target Yield:


- Year 1 4, 50% of ultimate yield
- Year 5 8, 75% of ultimate yield
- Every four-year period thereafter, 75% of ultimate yield

If project does not reach target yield, Metropolitan will reduce the ultimate yield

How Projects Have Performed Over Time




Cumulative Contractual Yield vs. Actual Production (AF)

- Reduced wet-year water production




Projected Production & Expenditures







Budgeting Process





- (1) The Conservation Program biennial expenditure authorization is \$86M.
- (2) As of 7/1/2022 -4/30/2023. Financial reporting has changed from modified accrual to cash basis. This resulted in \$9.2M of expenditures that were accrued last year but paid in cash this fiscal year.
- (3) Committed dollars as of May 10, 2023.

City of Chino Public Works Department
