Matters Impacting Metropolitan

California Supreme Court Addresses Legal Standard of Review in Whistleblower Retaliation Cases

In a unanimous decision, the California high court in *Wallen Lawson v. PPG Arch. Finishes Inc.*, said that the legal standard in California statutory whistleblower retaliation cases differs from the standard federal courts use in antidiscrimination employment lawsuits.

California Labor Code Section 1102.6 provides that when an employee demonstrates by a preponderance of the evidence that an employee's action to disclose a violation by the employer of state, federal or local law or regulation was a factor in an adverse employment action, the employer shall have the burden of proof to demonstrate that the adverse action would have been taken for legitimate independent reasons. Prior to the high court's decision, some lower courts in California had used the federal standard in state whistleblower retaliation cases. Under the federal standard, an employer need only show a legitimate business reason for acting against an employee. In the high court's written opinion, Justice Leondra Kruger described that federal standard as a "well-worn, but meaningfully different, burden shifting framework."

Instead of the federal standard, the high court explained that, in accordance with the statute, a California employee suing for whistleblower retaliation need only show that an illegal retaliatory motive was a contributing factor in an employer's decision to act against the employee. Once the employee makes that showing, the employer has the burden to show by "clear and convincing evidence" that it would have taken the same adverse employment action against the employee for legitimate, independent reasons.

Central Delta Water Agency v. California Department of Water Resources – Supreme Court denies review, ending the "Monterey Plus" Litigation

On January 5, 2022, the California Supreme Court denied review in a pair of appeals after the Court of Appeal issued its opinion in September 2021, affirming the trial court rulings in three cases regarding amendments to the State Water Project (SWP) contracts known as the Monterey Plus Amendments and related actions.

The Supreme Court's action ends 27 years of litigation over contract amendments first agreed to in 1995. Since DWR and the State Water Contractors have been operating under the underlying amendments for decades, the Supreme Court's denial maintains the status quo, ending decades of uncertainty.

In September 2021, the Court of Appeal upheld the adequacy of the "Monterey Plus" Environmental Impact Report (EIR) issued in 2010, the revised EIR issued in 2016, the validity of the Monterey Amendments and Kern Fan Element Transfer Agreement, and the trial court's denial of attorneys' fees. *Central Delta Water Agency v. Department of Water Resources* (2021) 69 Cal.App.5th 170. Plaintiffs argued that the amendments encourage unsustainable farming and place the Kern Water Bank under the control of private farming interests, and that DWR's environmental analysis overlooked potentially significant impacts to the Bay-Delta.

Metropolitan was an active participant in the many rounds of litigation along with other SWP contractors.

The litigation stems from amendments to the SWP contracts approved in 1995 after an agreement reached in late 1994 in Monterey. Those amendments altered the SWP water allocation procedures in times of shortage by eliminating the so-called "urban preference" and requiring instead that deliveries to both agricultural and urban SWP contractors would, with exceptions, be reduced proportionately. They also transferred land known as the Kern Fan Element from the Department of Water Resources to the Kern County Water Agency (then transferred to the Kern Water Bank Authority to create the Kern Water Bank); authorized permanent sales of water among contractors; and implemented various other changes in administration of the SWP.


Planning and Conservation League (PCL) and other plaintiffs litigated under CEQA and challenged the validity of both the Monterey Amendments and the Kern Fan Element transfer, resulting in a published decision in *Planning & Conservation League v. Department of Water Resources* (2000) 83 Cal.App.4th 892. The parties settled, and DWR agreed to prepare a new EIR that would cover the original Monterey Amendments, the Kern Fan Element transfer and some additional contract amendments that became known as the "Monterey Plus" project.

In 2010, DWR certified the Monterey Plus EIR, and two new cases were filed. Both challenged the

EIR under CEQA and one challenged the SWP contract amendments and Kern Fan Element transfer. The trial court ruled that the EIR failed to adequately analyze impacts of the Kern Water Bank on adjacent groundwater. In 2016, DWR certified a Revised Monterey Plus EIR to address the trial court ruling. Two more cases were filed challenging the revised EIR, but the trial court ruled in DWR's favor, and the three appeals ensued that have now been conclusively decided.

Approve amendments to the Administrative Code to establish changes in the committee structure of the Board; the General Manager has determined that the proposed action is exempt or otherwise not subject to CEQA

Executive Summary

At its November 23, 2021 special meeting, the Board approved the following changes to the Board's committee structure and directed staff to return to the Board with revisions to the Administrative Code required to implement the changes:

- 1. Establish a new Underserved Communities standing committee.
- 2. Establish a new Imported Water standing committee.
- 3. Establish the Conservation and Local Resources Special Committee as a standing committee and re-name as the Conservation and Local Resources One Water Committee.
- 4. Establish a new Diversity, Equity and Inclusion Committee as a standing committee.
- 5. Delete the Bay-Delta Committee.

Attachment 1 shows the new version of the Metropolitan Administrative Code as it would read upon Board approval of the proposed changes. The proposed substantive amendments are set forth on Attachment 2 with strikeouts showing deletions and underlining showing additions.

Details

In accordance with the authorization by the Board at the November 23, 2021 special meeting, this letter provides detail and proposed changes to the Metropolitan Administrative Code to implement changes to the Board's Committee structure to create four new standing committees (Underserved Communities, Imported Water, One Water (Conservation and Local Resources), and Diversity, Equity and Inclusion) and to delete the Bay-Delta Committee. The allocation of duties to the new committees requires minor modifications to the duties of the Water Planning and Stewardship; Engineering and Operations; and the Organization, Personnel and Technology Committees to avoid duplication. If approved by the Board, the changes will be effective February 1, 2022.

A clean copy of the proposed changes is attached as **Attachment 1**. A redlined copy showing all of the changes is attached as **Attachment 2**. The proposed changes to the committee structure and duties are summarized below.

A. <u>New Committees</u>

- 1. The new Underserved Communities Committee will study, advise and make recommendations regarding the ways in which Metropolitan can:
 - a. Better serve the disadvantaged and underserved communities within Metropolitan's service area.
 - b. Improve the access of these communities to reliable, high-quality drinking water supplies.
 - c. Increase the participation of currently underserved communities in Metropolitan's rebate, conservation, and other local resources programs.

d. Assist and support member agency programs and advocate for underserved communities, including providing operational and technical assistance.

The Underserved Communities Committee will meet as needed.

- 2. The new Imported Water Committee will study, advise and make recommendations regarding:
 - a. Issues relating to the protection of Metropolitan's rights to receive imported water supplies from any source.
 - b. Issues relating to the operation of the State Water Project and the implementation of Metropolitan's State Water Contract, including Bay-Delta issues.
 - c. Issues relating to the Colorado River, including negotiation and implementation of agreements with and among Colorado River Contractors.
 - d. The protection of Metropolitan's water supply from, and mitigation of the impacts of water development on, the Colorado River.
 - e. Issues relating to imported water from any additional source.
 - f. The effect of existing and proposed federal, state, and local environmental, water supply and water conveyance statutes, regulations and permits on Metropolitan's water supplies from all sources.
 - g. Policies and procedures regarding the delivery and exchange of imported water for various uses.
 - h. Receipt of the Water Surplus and Drought Management Report.

The Imported Water Committee will meet as needed.

- 3. The duties of the One Water (Conservation and Local Resources) Committee will include the duties of the prior Conservation and Local Resources Special Committee. The duties of the Committee will emphasize the comprehensive integration of programs to achieve One Water solutions and include:
 - a. Establishing policies and programs regarding water conservation and reuse, watershed management, storm water capture and management, recycling, sustainable groundwater management and protection, underground storage, and use thereof.
 - b. Seawater desalination, reclamation and their development and brackish water issues in Metropolitan's service area, and use thereof.
 - c. Overseeing development and implementation of Metropolitan's Local Resources and Conservation Programs and other efforts to meet local supply and water use efficiency.
 - d. Recommending comprehensive solutions to regional supply problems with the intent to increase water reliability, cost effectiveness and environmental benefit.
 - e. Expanding Metropolitan's understanding of regional water supply issues by inviting informational presentations and feedback from external representatives.
 - f. Creating opportunities for collaboration to advance development of local supplies and achieving greater water use efficiency.

The One Water (Conservation and Local Resources) Committee will meet as needed.

- 4. The Diversity, Equity and Inclusion (DE&I) Committee will:
 - a. Be the home committee for Metropolitan's DE&I Officer.
 - b. Receive input, policy, and procedure recommendations from the DE&I Council for consideration and recommendation to the full Board.
 - c. Study diversity, equity and inclusion issues within Metropolitan to recommend to the full Board programs to enhance and promote equal employment opportunity, affirmative action, increased diversity of the workforce and a culture of inclusion within Metropolitan.

- d. Promote workforce development programs, including training and advancement opportunities to increase diversity, equity and inclusion within Metropolitan and benefit the communities within Metropolitan's service area.
- e. Study areas of special concern to the District and its employees, including, but not limited to, equal employment opportunity and affirmative action.

The Diversity, Equity and Inclusion Committee will meet as needed.

B. <u>Deleted Committee</u>

The Bay-Delta Committee will be deleted.

C. <u>Changes in Duties of Existing Committees</u>

- 1. The duties of the Water Planning and Stewardship Committee will be modified to:
 - a. Transfer its duties relating to the Colorado River and State Water Project to the Imported Water Committee.
 - b. Transfer its duties relating to water conservation, recycling and reuse, storage and capture of water within local surface and groundwater facilities, desalination and related matters to the One Water (Conservation and Local Resources) Committee.
 - c. Retain the duties for Metropolitan's Water Supply Planning, including the Integrated Resources Planning Process and completion of the Urban Water Management Plan and related policies.
- 2. The duties which shall remain the same are:
 - a. Consider policies regarding importing, distributing, transferring and wheeling water as required by Metropolitan.
 - b. Consider the effect of existing and proposed federal, state, and local water supply, and water management statutes and environmental regulations on supplies within Metropolitan's service area.
 - c. Consider policies and procedures regarding the delivery and exchange of water for various uses.
 - d. Environmental compliance and requirements.
- 3. The duties of the Operations, Personnel and Technology Committee will be modified to move initial study of areas of special concern to Metropolitan and its employees, including equal employment opportunity and affirmative action to the Diversity, Equity and Inclusion Committee.
- 4. The duties of the Engineering and Operations Committee will be modified to include changes in Metropolitan's aqueduct system to provide for the changing needs of Metropolitan's member agencies.

(3) Changes to Metropolitan's Local Resources Program and Conservation Program and consideration of other efforts Metropolitan may undertake to help meet the local supply and water use efficiency goals contained in Metropolitan's most recent Integrated Resources Plan;

(4) The effect of existing and proposed federal, state, and local governmental, water supply and water management statutes and regulations on supplies produced or that may be produced within the District's region;

(5) Comprehensive solutions to regional supply problems which may increase water reliability and cost effectiveness, and benefit environmental and other beneficial instream uses of waters within the region;

(6) Expanding Metropolitan's understanding of regional water supply issues by inviting informational presentations and feedback from representatives of agencies that have developed or are implementing/managing local supplies and/or efficiency programs;

(7) Recommendations to the Board on policies and programs that will strengthen relationships with other agencies in furthering Metropolitan's objectives for increased regional self-reliance and greater water use efficiency; and

(8) Opportunities for collaboration to advance the mutual interests of agencies within Metropolitan's region in furthering the development of local supplies and achieving greater levels of water use efficiency.

§ 2503-2502. Integrated Resources Plan Special Committee.

(a) The Integrated Resources Plan Special Committee shall hold meetings as needed to accomplish the objectives of the committee.

(b) The Integrated Resources Plan Special Committee shall review, consider and make recommendations with regard to the Integrated Resources Planning Process, and options for updating the Integrated Resources Plan, including those recommended by the <u>Conservation and Local Resources</u> <u>One Water (Conservation and Local Resources) Committee</u> and the Water Planning and Stewardship Committee.

Comments submitted by Dir. Quinn regarding Item 7-10 of Legal and Claims Committee Received by Board Executive Secretary via email on January 10, 2022 at 7:54 p.m.

The duties of the One Water (Conservation and Local Resources) Committee will include the duties of the prior Conservation and Local Resources Special Committee. The Committee will have authority over the planning, prioritization, and funding of any current or future regional demand management or supply projects within the Metropolitan service area receiving funding from Metropolitan, such as the Regional Recycling Project and local projects funded through Metropolitan's Local Resources Program. The duties of the Committee will emphasize the comprehensive integration of programs to achieve One Water solutions and include:

- a. Establishing policies and programs regarding water conservation and reuse, watershed management, storm water capture and management, recycling, sustainable groundwater management and protection, underground storage, and use thereof.
- b. Seawater desalination, reclamation and their development and brackish water issues in Metropolitan's service area, and use thereof.
- c. Overseeing development and implementation of Metropolitan's Local Resources and Conservation Programs and other efforts to meet local supply and water use efficiency.
- d. Recommending comprehensive solutions to regional supply problems with the intent to increase water reliability, cost effectiveness and environmental benefit.
- e. Expanding Metropolitan's understanding of regional water supply issues by inviting informational presentations and feedback from external representatives.
- <u>f.</u> Creating opportunities for collaboration to advance development of local supplies and achieving greater water use efficiency.
- g. Reconcile planning processes for IRP, and UWMP_implementation, with the means for meeting established goals set by the Underserved Communities CommitteeCoordinate and align new water supplies, local resources projects and programs, and investments with other Metropolitan strategic priorities and initiatives...
- f.<u>h. Develop criteria for the prioritization of investments in new water supplies.</u>

The duties of the Water Planning and Stewardship Committee will be modified to:

a. Transfer its duties relating to the Colorado River and State Water Project to the Imported Water Committee.

b. Transfer its duties relating to water conservation, recycling and reuse, storage and capture of water within local surface and groundwater facilities, desalination and related matters to the One Water (Conservation and Local Resources) Committee, including the Regional Recycling Project and any future local project that receives funding from Metropolitan.

c. Retain the duties for Metropolitan's Water Supply Planning, including the Integrated Resources Planning Process and completion of the Urban Water Management Plan and related policies.
